UNDERSTANDING "CHURCH"

It is always such a blessing to celebrate Eucharist, pray and share with brother priests who are so genuine, holy, decent and committed to Christ. I hope you find my thoughts on Ecumenism helpful this Sunday and next.

This week I had the privilege of time for study with a group of priests from across the country. We discussed the Apostolicity of the church, the relationship between Catholic and Orthodox Christians and cooperation in evangelization between Catholics and Pentecostals. Our speakers were excellent as we worked long days on the hopes and challenges in Ecumenism, the vital work of promoting unity as Christ wants. Much has been done, but a vast amount remains still to do. It is blessed to note how much good will exists among many Christian groups as they discuss each other's views with respect and appreciation. This is very complex with people having strongly held views historically conditioned. One example was given of "Friendly divisions within borders" when people have little understanding of their faith and are at home in a Catholic, Lutheran, Presbyterian, etc., worship service. It is great that people come together praying in Christ as Savior; however, problems arise when we do not know what we believe. There is much to be said for acceptance and appreciation of all faiths, but there is need for honest dialogue based on history, truth and desire to know what Christ wanted and set in place for all time. In the many denominations there are "contrastive identifiers" which are important but can be a problem if not dealt with in patience and love. There can be a tendency at times for us to say "We all believe in God, Jesus, and the Bible, so why can't we all get along since one way is as good as another?" It is not that simple – we have many Christian expressions and unity is the mind of Christ. There is a great desire all over the world to promote unity and we must work relentlessly for this.

In addition to the above topics we discussed the recent Vatican statement on the church. The reaction to this in the media caused some anger and confusion among Catholics and non-Catholics alike. Often the secular press can misunderstand church activities. In our discussions we went into all aspects of the document. It is largely internal to the Catholic Church to help Catholics be sure of the value and importance of the church now and always. The Pope is not opposed to Ecumenism but is stating our belief so all can see who we are and dialogue from there.

Those who do not realize that this is what the church has always taught find it astonishing, but upon further reflection find it is not something new. There is continuity here with all the church has taught over the years. It is consistent with what Vatican II meant. The tone may not have been attractive to everyone, but the content is normal and necessary. Some will have difficulty with it but should not stop working together with other Christians in love and respect to acknowledge what we see to be truly of Christ and the Gospel, and thereby

the church, in one another. Most Catholics, and indeed the Pope, would not deny that many denominations which have emerged in the almost 500 years since the Reformation are indeed called "churches" in common language today. All the Pope is saying is that these are not churches as Catholic theology understands "church". It is important to see in the document that "separated communities are neither deprived of significance or importance in the mystery of salvation." Differing understandings must not impede us from dialogue and forging from that dialogue relations based on mutual trust and understanding, but we cannot set aside how one's own tradition understands the truth. Ecumenical dialogue is meant to restore unity to the Body of Christ, but this unity is built on truth. Dialogue is not meant to undermine one another's claims but to understand them. This can be painful, time consuming, slow and tedious but what a reward!

Catholic identity is very important in every age, so I share a few words on the meaning of church in this context. It is clear that the church begins with Jesus Christ who is its head as the church is His body. It belongs to Him and all who call themselves followers of Christ must form His church. Christ by His death and resurrection has gained for all people salvation and a holy way of life. He wants all his followers to know Him and love Him sharing His life with others in the church. All those whose lives are shaped by God's grace are, in the same fashion, related to Jesus Christ and His church. The church, of course, is to be a visible community marked by three signs: (1) The profession of the apostolic faith; (2) the celebration of the seven sacraments; and, (3) apostolic governance.

The apostolic faith was proclaimed in the preaching of the apostles themselves and is found in the New Testament. The essentials of the apostolic faith in the official teaching of the church has been preserved through the action of the Holy Spirit promised by Christ to protect and guide the church always.

The seven sacraments of the apostolic churches are the actions of the Risen Christ and continue to be celebrated in the Catholic Church and Orthodox churches.

Apostolic governance in the church is continued historically through the body of pastors that succeeds to the authority of the apostles and evangelizers and heads of local churches – the college of bishops in union with the Bishop of Rome, successor to St. Peter.

The Catholic Church understands herself as enjoying, through Jesus' own will and love, all the gifts that He left for His people. Other churches and faith communities enjoy most or some of these gifts depending on their history or their own self-understanding. Indeed some sincere followers of Christ reject the Catholic Church's understanding of who the church is. We recognize this, but surely we have the right to have our understanding of church respected as should all others.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD – 19TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

READINGS: WISDOM 18:6-9 · PSALM 33:1, 12, 18-22 · HEBREWS 11:1-2, 8-19 · LUKE 12:32-48

OVERVIEW:

The Wisdom of Solomon was written in the latter part of the first century B.C., probably in Alexandria, Egypt. It was composed by a Greek speaking Jew to preserve the memory of how God had guided his people in their long, difficult journey through history, and how he continues to guide them by His Wisdom. The author recalls “our fathers,” meaning the patriarchs. Chief among them was Abraham who was promised by God that his descendants would become a great nation (Gen. 12:2). The remembrance of God’s promises each Passover reaffirmed the “oath” sworn by God and Abraham, which established the covenant. By renewing their pledge of fidelity, the Jews of Alexandria were encouraged to live out their faith in a non-Jewish society. Hebrews 11 is sometimes called the “roll call of the heroes of faith.” But that’s not quite right, for heroes are known for their achievements while the individuals listed in this chapter are known for their faith. In this week’s second reading Abraham is celebrated as a prime example of faith. At pivotal moments in salvation history, ordinary individuals like Abraham were called to extraordinary tasks that tested their faith. The “oath” that Abraham swore gave him the strength to persevere when his faith was challenged. In this week’s gospel Jesus calls his disciples to vigilance, courage and always being ready for the Lord who will come “at an hour you do not expect.” The Gospel is related to the first reading when Jesus says. “Gird your loins and light your lamps”, which is an allusion to the Exodus and the yearly celebration of the Passover. While this reading is usually understood in terms of the Second Coming, it is relevant to the Mass, which also requires preparation on our part, as well as attentiveness. We “keep our lamps lit” that is to say, we must not only stay awake during Mass (!) we must be spiritually alert and ready at all times “as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ.” In the Mass, we renew our own baptismal covenant and confirm the oath that Abraham swore.

Key verse: “The night of the Passover was known beforehand to our fathers, that, with sure knowledge of the oaths in which they put their faith, they might have courage.” (Wisdom 18:6)

CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH:

"The second commandment forbids false oaths. Taking an oath or swearing is to take God as witness to what one affirms. It is to invoke the divine truthfulness as a pledge of one's own truthfulness." [no. 2150]

POPE FRANCIS:

"Jesus' invitation is to never be ashamed of him but to follow him always with total dedication, trusting in him and entrusting oneself to him." [Homily, July 31, 2013]

LIFE APPLICATION:

The simple act of going to church on Sunday is no small thing. It is a courageous act, not unlike that first Passover when the actions of the Jews, which were liturgical actions, threatened the status quo and challenged the authority of Pharaoh. One of the liturgical requirements of the Passover was to stay awake and keep watch through the night (Ex. 12:42; see also Mt. 26:38, 41). There’s always the danger that Mass becomes so routine we practically sleep walk through it. It’s important that we are always alert, spiritually. Keeping the Sabbath day holy and celebrating the Holy Eucharist requires holy vigilance. We must always be ready to follow the Lord whenever he calls, and wherever he leads us. Each Sunday we renew our baptismal promises and pledge our fidelity to Christ the Lord. By doing so, we gain confidence and courage to follow Christ and profess our faith in an increasingly unbelieving and sometimes hostile world.

REFLEXIÓN SOBRE EL MENSAJE DE HOY

En esta liturgia de la Palabra, podemos encontrar de una manera más o menos explícita, el tema de la bienaventuranza: «Dichosos los criados a quienes el amo encuentre vigilantes cuando llegue [...] ¡Dichoso ese criado sí, al llegar su amo, lo encuentra haciendo lo que debe!». Sabemos bien que, según el mensaje bíblico, la bienaventuranza no consiste en un vago consuelo dado a quien se encuentra en una situación de sufrimiento. Hasta las bienaventuranzas que inauguran el magno «sermón del monte» (Mt 5,1-13) son más bien inyecciones de ánimo e invitación a la lucha, a ejemplo de Aquel que es el pobre por excelencia, el misericordioso por antonomasia, el más perseguido de todos. Es, ante todo, la bienaventuranza que brota de la historia humana, cuando ésta es considerada como visitada por Dios, es decir, enriquecida por la presencia de Aquel que, después de haber creado al hombre, no le abandona a su destino, sino que le orienta por el camino de la salvación; de Aquel que, después de haber elegido a su pueblo, no lo deja a merced de los enemigos, sino que lo lleva sano y salvo a la meta feliz de la tierra prometida.



Es, también, la bienaventuranza que procede de la fe, que es un don especial que nos hace Dios a nosotros, peregrinos sobre la tierra. Desde esta perspectiva, fue bienaventurado Abrahán porque creyó y fue también bienaventurada Sara por haber aceptado la promesa del Señor. Ambos fueron bienaventurados por haber sido atraídos totalmente a la órbita de Dios, porque se encaminaron dócilmente por el camino que Dios les había indicado, porque estaban radicalmente convencidos de que Dios también puede resucitar a los muertos.

Es, por último, la bienaventuranza del siervo que se da cuenta de la maravilla que supone poder «conocer» la voluntad de su Señor y se dispone con gozosa libertad a traducirla en obras buenas y en un estilo de vida digno de él. Esa bienaventuranza encuentra la siguiente motivación evangélica: «A quien se le dio mucho se le podrá exigir mucho». Como es obvio, este dicho de Jesús, con el que se cierra la página evangélica que hemos leído hoy, pretende explicitar el dinamismo de la relación que discurre entre Dios y el hombre, cuando esta relación está marcada y es vivida siguiendo la lógica de la alianza, que considera a Dios como primer acto y al hombre como invitado a un diálogo de amor. No hay nada más exigente que el amor cuando éste se encarna en una relación de alianza.

A partir de aquí podemos seguir dos caminos: o abandonar todo a su destino o mostrar que creemos en la amistad de Alguien que puede ayudarnos y atrevernos a pedirle esa ayuda. El amigo va a molestar a su amigo a media noche, y Abrahán se dirige a Dios con audacia: «Me he atrevido a hablar a mi Señor». Ambos interceden con insistencia y obtienen lo que han pedido, demostrando la verdad de este dicho: «Mucho puede la oración insistente del justo» (Sant 5,16). Cuando vemos a nuestro alrededor situaciones difíciles, ¿reaccionamos con resignación —«la puerta está cerrada» (Lc 11,7)— o con la esperanza audaz y paciente de quien cree en el amor del Padre?

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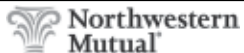
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
